My major in MIS was a mix between business and technology and

allowed me to learn about the fundamentals of each and how they intersect.

While on campus, I was involved in several student organizations like the Undergraduate Student Government (formerly Minnesota Student Association), the National Society of Black Engineers, the Multicultural Center for Academic Excellence, and the National Association of Black Accountants. All of these organizations allowed me to find a community on campus and foster deep connections with others who I now consider to be my best friends. I was also able to gain professional and transferrable skills in my life after graduating. Quick thanks to the UMWC because the scholarships I received allowed me to spend less time working and more time being involved in the University of Minnesota community.

Upon graduating, I had a job offer



from Optum for a role in a technology development program, which consists of two, six-month rotations in areas of technology. I began this role in July 2022 in a data analytics role for my first rotation and am currently in my second rotation in product management. My MIS major has been very helpful in my career today as I still use what I have learned in class in my career. In addition, it makes me happy to know that I can help shape the healthcare technology space by focusing on how I can use technology to solve healthcare inequities. I am also currently in the planning phases of starting my own business providing unplugged events services in the Twin Cities. Navigating this has been a journey of constantly learning new things
